About the Bean Foundation

History

Norwin S. Bean was born in Manchester, New Hampshire in 1873 and was graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology with a degree in electrical engineering. He served as Treasurer and Chief Executive Officer of Manchester Savings Bank and was a prominent business and civic leader. His charitable activities included the Manchester Community Chest, Family Service Society, the Institute of Arts and Science and the Currier Gallery.

Elizabeth N. (Nichols) Bean was born in Amherst, New Hampshire and was a member of the Amherst Congregational Church. She was active in many charitable organizations, including the Amherst Visiting Nurse Association and Amherst Historical Society. The Bean Foundation began operations upon her death in 1967.

Governance

The Bean Foundation is governed by two Senior Trustees who serve fifteen-year terms and three Term Trustees appointed for a three-year term. The Board of Trustees makes the final decision on all grant applications. They also oversee the Foundation's investment portfolio, currently managed by Goldman, Sachs & Co.

2008 Grants

The Norwin S. and Elizabeth N. Bean Foundation makes grant awards to nonprofit organizations and public agencies working in arts and humanities, education, environment, health, human services and for public benefit in the communities of Manchester and Amherst, New Hampshire. In 2008, the Foundation made grant awards totaling \$608,901 to forty-three organizations. Nine public schools received funding totaling \$2,969 through the Education Enhancement Fund.

Six arts and humanities organizations received support from the Bean Foundation in 2008. These projects ranged from supporting the Manchester Community Music School's new music therapy program to assisting in funding the installation of a cushioned floor specifically designed for dance in the rehearsal rooms of the United Arts Center at the Palace Theatre. A grant to the Majestic Theatre supported hiring of a consultant to help the board develop a strategic plan and the Concord Community Music School received support for their *Music in the Community Initiative*, which serves children, teens and adults in Manchester.

Of the six grants awarded in the health field, two were capital gifts which helped Child Health Services to renovate and the Manchester Community Health Center to relocate in order to increase service capacity. The others ranged from helping to continue services to at-risk, linguistically isolated families from minority communities through the "Bright Start" program, to expanding HIV/Aids testing to Latina and African women, and strengthening management at Pastoral Counseling Services.

In Education, Breakthrough Manchester, formerly Summerbridge, received support in measuring student academic improvement, Emerging Leaders in Communities of Color received a grant to help create income necessary to become sustainable, and the New Hampshire Historical Society received an award to provide state history programming to approximately 1600 students in Manchester.

In 2008, the largest number of grant awards continued to be in Human Services. Four affordable housing and shelter organizations in Manchester received the third year of core support at \$20,000 each, based on meeting self-defined strategic goals. The Somali Development Center and New American Africans both received grant support to strengthen their organizations, thereby increasing their capacity to help refugees and immigrants integrate into their new country. Child and Family Services received support to build a new Transitional Living Facility for Teens and renovate the current Teen Services Center, and the Manchester Community Resource Center was able to install a vertical platform lift to make its facility accessible to all program recipients.

Two of the awards in the category of social/public benefit went to nonprofits in Amherst. Funding was awarded for repairs to the Community Building of Elizabeth Bean's former church, the Congregational Church of Amherst. Support was granted for a six month pilot transportation service for residents of the Souhegan region to Nashua, NH, for medical appointments and care.

The Bean Foundation has received NH Charitable Foundation contract support for administration and grant review since the 1970s. In recent years, the NH Charitable Foundation determined that the contract role no longer met their strategic priorities and, after meeting with Bean Foundation Trustees, it was agreed that the Bean Foundation would transition out of the contract relationship by the end of 2008. In February, Kathy Cook was hired by the Bean Foundation as its new grant manager and the foundation's office was moved to 40 Stark Street in Manchester. The NH Charitable Foundation offered support throughout the transition and the two organizations look forward to continued cooperation and collaboration.

The 2008 Annual Meeting of the Norwin S. and Elizabeth Bean Foundation was held at Child Health Services, where a large group of non-profit leaders, former Trustees, and representatives of other area foundations heard Anna Thomas of the Manchester Health Department give a presentation on Manchester's health care needs and future plans titled, "Believe in a City."
